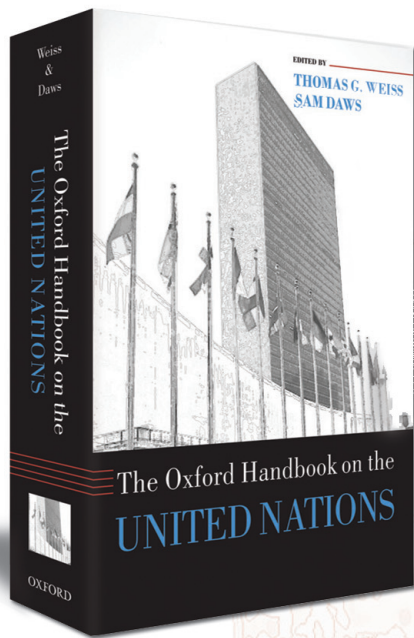

This volume is intended to shape the discipline of UN studies, and to establish itself as the essential point of reference for all those working on, in, or around the world organisation. It is substantial in scope, containing contributions from over 40 leading scholars and practitioners—writing sometimes controversially, but always authoritatively—on the key topics and debates that define the institution.

Thomas G. Weiss is Presidential Professor of Political Science at The CUNY Graduate Center and Director of the Ralph Bunche Institute for International Studies, where he is co-director of the United Nations Intellectual History Project. He is the chair of the Academic Council on the UN System and the former editor of its journal, *Global Governance*. He has written or edited some 35 books and numerous articles about multilateral approaches to international peace and security, humanitarian action, and sustainable development.

Sam Daws is Executive Director of the United Nations Association of the UK. He has served as a senior policy adviser on UN issues for 17 years, including three years as First Officer in the Executive Office of Secretary-General Kofi Annan. He previously directed a Geneva-based international consultancy. He undertook doctoral studies on UN reform at New College, Oxford, and has been a visiting fellow at Cambridge and Yale Universities. He has written or edited six books on the UN.

SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES

SIR MARK MALLOCH BROWN was appointed Minister of State at the FCO for the UN and Africa in June 2007. Prior to this, he served as Deputy Secretary-General of the United Nations, and Chef de Cabinet. Sir Mark previously served in several organs of the UN, including as Administrator of the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), in the Office of the High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) and as Chair of the United Nations Development Group. In between UN appointments, he was Vice-President for External Affairs and Vice-President for UN Affairs at the World Bank. He also worked as the lead international partner at the Sawyer-Miller Group, and recently served as Vice-Chairman of Soros Fund Management and of the Open Society. Sir Mark founded *The Economist Development Report*. He was named by *Time Magazine* as one of the world's 100 most influential people in 2005.

SAM DAWS is co-editor of *The Oxford Handbook on the United Nations*. He is Executive Director of the United Nations Association of the UK. He served as a senior policy adviser on UN issues for seventeen years, including three years as First Officer in the Executive Office of Secretary-General Kofi Annan. He previously directed a Geneva-based international consultancy, and worked briefly in FCO research analysts (global issues), and in the House of Commons. He undertook doctoral studies on UN reform at New College, Oxford, and has been a visiting fellow at Cambridge and Yale Universities. He has written or edited six books on the United Nations.

LORD HANNAY OF CHISWICK entered the Foreign & Commonwealth Office in 1959, and was initially posted to Tehran and Kabul. He was involved in the negotiations that led to the UK's entry into the European Communities. During the 1970s he did a four-year spell in the European Commission in Brussels; and then served as Under-Secretary (European Communities) at the FCO, Minister at the British Embassy in Washington DC, and Ambassador and Permanent Representative to the European Communities. From 1990 to 1995, he was Ambassador and Permanent Representative to the UN in New York. Following his retirement from the diplomatic service, he was the British Special Representative for Cyprus, and a member of the UN Secretary-General's High-level Panel on Threats, Challenges and Change. In 2001 he was created a life peer, and in 2003 he was made a Companion of Honour. He has been Chair of the United Nations Association of the UK since January 2006.

SIR ADAM ROBERTS has been the Montague Burton Professor of International Relations at Oxford University, and Fellow of Balliol College, since 1986. His main teaching and research interests are in the fields of international security, international organisations, and international law (including the laws of war). He has also worked extensively on the role of civil resistance against dictatorial regimes and foreign rule, and on the history of thought about international relations. He is a member of the Council of the International Institute for Strategic Studies, London and of the UK Defence Academy Advisory Board. He is an Honorary Fellow of the London School of Economics & Political Science, and of St Antony's College, Oxford.

AMBASSADOR NICK THORNE has served as the Permanent Representative of the UK Mission to the UN and other International Organisations in Geneva since 2003. Prior to that he served in the UK Mission to the UN in New York from 1995; first as Counsellor Finance and then, from 1998, as an elected member of the UN advisory committee dealing with management and reform issues (ACABQ). Nick Thorne joined the Foreign & Commonwealth Office in 1965 and served in Yaounde, Brussels, New York and Manila, before returning to the FCO in London in 1987 as Deputy Head of the United Nations Department and Head of Human Rights. After an attachment to industry (Thorn/EMI) in 1989, Nick served as Deputy Head of Mission in Helsinki from 1991 to 1995.

PROFESSOR THOMAS G. WEISS is co-editor of *The Oxford Handbook on the United Nations*. He is Presidential Professor of Political Science at The CUNY Graduate Center and Director of the Ralph Bunche Institute for International Studies, where he is co-director of the United Nations Intellectual History Project. He is Chair of the Academic Council on the UN System (ACUNS) and former editor of *Global Governance*. He has written or edited some 35 books and numerous scholarly articles about multilateral approaches to international peace and security, humanitarian action, and sustainable development.

DR NGAIRE WOODS is Director of the Global Economic Governance Programme at University College, Oxford, where she is also Dean of Graduates. Her most recent book is *The Globalisers: The IMF, the World Bank, and their Borrowers* (2006). She has served as Adviser to UNDP's *Human Development Report*, and more recently as External Evaluator of the IMF's Independent Evaluation Office. She has published extensively on international institutions, globalisation, and governance.
